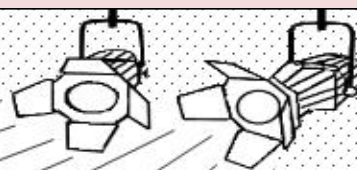

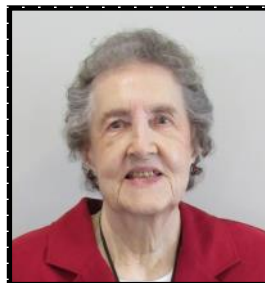

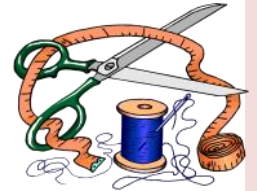

NEW CHANGES! READ CAREFULLY! Dewitt County is the host this year for International Day, which will be held, September 19 from 11a.m. to 2p.m. at the Macon County Extension Office. They have been working very hard on creating a new format which includes specific recipes and story board assignments for each county. We were assigned 5 specific recipes which have been taste tested and adjusted by the Dewitt ladies. MACON COUNTY “HOME BUREAU” FACTS AND MEMORIES

The facts and memories that I am using for the newsletter were taken from a large binder that has been completed and contains “priceless” and “precious” memories of the start of the “Home Bureau” in Macon County in 1918. I hope you enjoy these articles as much as I have enjoyed delving through our history.

The roles of the county board in 1918 were the president, 1st vice-president, 2nd vice-president, outgoing president, treasurer, secretary, foods, health and sanitation, household management, and clothing. In 1920, the record shows that there were many separate units. They were: Sharon, Harristown, Forsyth, Batchelder, Maroa, Long Creek, Casner, Macon, Argenta, Mt. Zion, Niantic, Warrensburg, Blue Mound, Long Creek Girl’s Club, Staley’s, Oreana, and West Side Decatur.

An excerpt from Miss Eugenia Allin’s 1920 secretary’s report states that “The Macon County Home Bureau has just completed its second year and like such in the life of most infants, it has had its trials and tribulations but in general it has proved a most satisfactory year replete with accomplishments which show a steady growth and a firm foundation. The numbers the first year was something over 700, since we were instructed to count all pledges signed. Since that time, all who had failed to honor these pledges by payment of dues have been weeded out so that the present membership of 631 represents only names in good standing whose dues are paid to date.”

I will share more of these interesting facts and memories in upcoming newsletters.

In 1918, when our “Home Bureau” or Macon County Association for Home and Community Education, as we are now called, the President was Woodrow Wilson, a democrat from New Jersey. The Vice President was Thomas R. Marshall, a democrat from Indiana.

DID YOU KNOW?

The United States flag had only 48 stars on it. In 1918, the Congress was in its 65th session.

DID YOU KNOW?

On January 8, 1918, President Wilson delivered his Fourteen Points Speech to Congress. This was a statement for peace that was to be used for peace negotiations in order to end World War I.

DID YOU KNOW?

The U.S. Congress established the time zones and approved daylight savings time which went into effect on March 31, 1918.

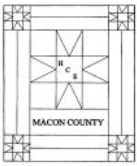
