## SHOULD A WOMAN WORK AFTER SHE IS MARRIED?, 1924 DEBATE

The following is a shorter version of the article that I was given. I will highlight some of the comments that were made at this debate. This debate was conducted in the home of Mrs. Walter Dipper with members of the Sharon Home Bureau debating both earnestly and ably. Thirty women heard the debate whose question was: Resolved that women should continue to work at their professions after marriage. The negative won. The affirmative side was upheld by Mrs. R.J. Hinkle, and Mrs. Fred Hays while Mrs. L.E. Barnhart and Mrs. William Sawyer took the negative side.

Mrs. Hinkle took the affirmative side and took as her main point that working improves a woman's disposition, that she meets more people, develops her personality and keeps an active mind as opposed to the sluggish mind of the purely home woman!!! The ladies also contended that a married working woman gets paid for her work, helping out with the household expenses and therefore, a husband does not have to be a slave to his family. They also contended that a woman enjoys her children more and they are better off than if she is with them all of the time. They insisted that professional women could hire good maids and good nurse girls to care for the children as there are always women who know this kind of work and want to do it.

Mrs. William Sawyer led the negative and brought down the house by declaring that if a woman didn't have the money she ought to have, she had a right to go through her husband's trouser pockets to get it! She insisted that women did not need to work for men were willing to keep them supplied with money but the men had so much on their minds that they often forgot to do that. She also suggested that if professional women were poor cooks and poor housekeepers, they could join the Home Bureau and learn to do it properly. She pointed out that the home is the foundation of society and the government and that the woman is the center of

that home and she declared the working wife and mother to be a detriment not only to the home but to the nation as well.

As you may surmise from this short summary of the article, this debate still goes on today. When I was growing up, my mother was a stay-at-home mother, as were many of my friends' mothers. We didn't think anything about it because that was just the way things were. She was there when I came home from school at noon for lunch, and she was there when I got home from school to help me with any schoolwork. I treasure those memories now. I grew up in a very loving family and I have to say that my mother was the foundation of our home.

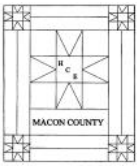
