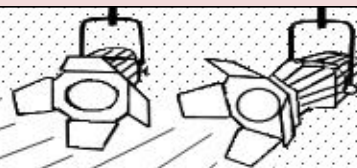

DO YOU KNOW HOW "HOME EXTENSION" CAME INTO BEING?

These excerpts are from an article that Karen Halicki sent me for the 75th anniversary of the Smith-Lever Act on May 8, 1989. The author, David Lee Hunter, wrote the article in rhyme, but it gives us a rather humorous, factual accounting of the development of Home Extension. I don't have space to do the whole article, so I have chosen only a little bit to share with you. Enjoy!

Our Hats Are Off To the Homemakers
The modern conveniences of today were not her lot
She cooked over a hot wood stove in an old iron pot.
She washed; she ironed; she cooked; she sewed
Yes, her lot in life carried a heavy load.
She was not one feigned on by fame or glory
Although she sometimes dreamed of being a
Cinderella as in the children's story.
Now there were many who contended that she was
willing to accept her fate
Of housekeeper, cook and general helpmate.
But, down in her soul, this was not true
She longed for a way to express herself too.
Because within her from the beginning of creation
Lay the seed that could develop into a leader of
a country, state or nation.

In this part of the article, he talks about the passage of the Morrill Act (1862) that established Land Grant Colleges throughout the land. As a result of this act, farmers had better educational opportunities as did the women, as the colleges began to open their doors to them. He also talks about the Hatch Act that enabled experimental stations for the farmer, but the needed information wasn't getting out to the men and women living on the farm. This is where I will pick up his article.

Some of them educators would just sit around and pout
And say: "they ain't read them bulletins we've been sending out."
And in spite of all our forces
They just won't come out to listen to short courses.
There soon appeared on the scene, two men with one accord.
In 1914 year of our Lord.
Each of them declared, "in our educational system
I am a believer"
They went by the name of Smith and Lever.
They said, "There are country people out there that are
Living in strife."
And we've got the information that will provide them a better life."
Yes, Congressman Lever said, "On a new course
We need to embark.
And then he made a historical remark.
We've helped the farm man better how to plow
We've helped him with his horses, hogs and his old milk cow.

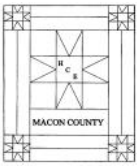
Yea, we helped him for over four decades and a quarter
But we ain't done much for his wife and daughter.
We've concentrated on helping the men
We've done so little for the women, it's undoubtedly a sin.
So, Smith and Lever went out and made it a fact
And got through Congress the Smith-Lever Act.
Through this Act, they helped many people to touch
The purpose of this Act was stated as such.
"To aid in diffusing among the people of the U.S.
Useful and practical information and home economics and to
Encourage the application of the same."

The next part of the article talked about the establishment of home economics programs that changed the social patterns and provided women with more self-esteem. As a result, extension programs began to spread throughout the land. These home agents worked with young girls through canning clubs, and livestock clubs. As time moved on, year after year, more Extension programs began to enlarge in size, and spread to the cities and towns. As modern devices came about, it took less time for housework to be done, and the homemaker could "expand her horizons". The homemakers could focus on the community about them with "victory gardens", "food for freedom", and "human rights". The last part of his article is what I will leave you with to "ponder and smile" that we belong to such a wonderful organization.

Ah, yes the homemaker's programs have helped women equip
For volunteer leaders and community leadership.
We could talk on and on and the gamut would run
But these are but a few things that homemakers have done.
These programs have helped the homemaker
Throughout her life
To become a better citizen, mother, and wife.
And more that that, they helped her fulfill a dream
Of having her own identity, worth and self-esteem.
